<u>Poster: 1:</u> Would In-house Cortisol Testing on the Beckman DxI Instrument Provide Accurate, Cost-effective Results for Sacred Heart Patients?

• We validated Cortisol results using the DxI600 so that we can implement testing at PSHMC. We tested precision, linearity, sample stability, and reference ranges in order to allow for uninterupted service to in-house patients.

Poster: 2: Cary-Blair Medium: The Effect of Volume on Enteric Pathogen Detection

The question explored in this study is whether or not the volume of Cary-Blair transport medium affects the detection of enteric
pathogens when minimal specimen is available. We used frozen samples previously tested culture-positive for E. coli 0157, Salmonella,
Shigella, and Campylobacter and did PCR testing for pathogen detection.

<u>Poster: 3:</u> What is the Optimal Procedure for Inoculating Carrot Broth with Samples in the ESwab Transport Device for the detection of Group B Strep?

We determined the optimal procedure for inoculating carrot broth with samples in the ESwab transport device, for the
detection of Group B Strep. Methods include serial dilutions of Group B Strep using 0.5 MacFarland standard.

Poster: 4 Bordetella pertussis Eswab Validation Study

 In this experiment two transport medias (Eswab and Amies charcoal) have been tested for their performance in isolation of Bordetella Pertussis. Methods include inoculation of the transport media and incubation for several time points and temperatures after which the samples are plated and counted.

Poster: 5: Routine and Stat Hgb A1c testing at Providence Sacred Heart Medical Center

Providence Sacred Heart Medical Center Laboratory has seen an increased demand for routine and stat Hgb A1c testing.
 The rationale behind ordering a retrospective test as a stat was investigated, as well as the clinical significance of the increase in Hgb A1c testing.

<u>Poster: 6</u>: Evaluation of efficacy in bringing the Hepatitis B Antibody assay online inhouse at Kootenai Health

Whitney Klemm, Providence Sacred Heart School of Medical Laboratory Science, Spokane, WA

 A comparison study was done to determine whether or not discontinuing send-out testing of the Anti-HBs assay and bringing it online in-house was cost-effective without sacrificing quality. This compared the send-out facility testing to laboratory testing done on sight at Kootenai Health.

<u>Poster: 7</u>: Would bringing Free Triiodothyroxine testing in-house be cost effective and accurate at Kootenai Health?

 An overview of fT3 testing principles, methodology, and clinical significance, including statistics regarding the comparison, linearity, and precision studies conducted at KH and PAML, the current company conducting the send-out testing on fT3 for KH.

<u>Poster: 8</u>: Rapid Detection of Extended-Spectrum Beta-Lactamase Producing Escherichia coli and Klebsiella pneumoniae Using ESBL DNP and the Resultant Impact on Patient Therapy

Jessica Westberry, Providence School of Medical Laboratory Science, Spokane, WA

 This study examined impact on patient therapy when using a rapid test to detect ESBL-producing isolates from positive blood cultures.

<u>Poster: 9</u>: Comparison of Alere PBP2a Immunochromatographic Assay and CHROMagar MRSA to aid in the Earlier Detection of MRSA Infections at Providence Sacred Heart Medical Center

The purpose of this study is to evaluate the test performance and cost of two separate methods which would allow for a
more rapid identification of MSSA/MRSA. The Alere PBP2a immunochromatographic assay and the CHROMagar MRSA are
both methods in which MRSA can be distinguished from MSSA faster than traditional methods.

<u>Poster: 10</u>: Measurement of Paraoxonase-3 in HDL: Characterization of a Targeted Proteomics Assay

Tatiana Weaver, University of Washington, Seattle, WA

 Evaluation of precision and linearity of a targeted proteomics assay based on liquid chromatography-tandem mass spectrometry designed for the measurement of paraoxonase-3 in human high-density lipoprotein. Comparison of three internal standardization approaches with respect to precision and linearity.

<u>Poster: 11</u>: Threading the Needle: Improving Psychological Outcomes in Pediatric Venipuncture

Jenny Trnka-Oliver, University of Washington, Seattle, WA

• An overview of interventions that reduce anxiety and pain during pediatric venipuncture, and a proposed book for children and their parents for use in an outpatient setting.
